Fred Shiosaki and George T. Yamada Receive Nation's Highest Civilian Honor

On Wednesday, November 02, 2011, U.S. Senator Maria Cantwell joined in honoring 33 World War II Japanese American veterans from Washington State with the highest civilian award in the United States. The Congressional Medal of Honor Ceremony took place in the U.S. Capitol Visitor Center's Emancipation Hall where hundreds of Nisei veterans from across the country were honored.

The ceremony honored members of the 100th Infantry Battalion, 442nd Regimental Combat Team and the Military Intelligence Services of the United States Army. The 442nd Regimental Combat Team was one of the most decorated units in military history, bringing home 21 Congressional Medals of Honor, 33 Distinguished Service Crosses, 559 Silver Stars, 22 Legions of Merit, 4,000 Bronze Stars and 9, 846 Purple Hearts. This thank you was more than 70 years overdue when on Wednesday 11-02-11 when Congress awarded them its highest civilian honor.

Many of these soldiers fought for what this country could be, while their families lived in internment camps. They wanted to show the world and America that they loved their country and would stand with her in battle.

Four Spokane Washington residents received this honor:

Charles T. Furumasu , George A. Minata, Fred A. Shiosaki and George T. Yamada

In all about 6,000 Japanese-Americans served in the Military Intelligence Service, translating cables and interviewing prisoners of war. Many also served during the postwar occupation of Japan, providing a bridge between Japanese and American officials. Fred says at home he had to speak some Japanese, since neither parent spoke a lot of English, but he never learned to read or write Japanese. Because of this Fred only qualified for the infantry so, after graduation Fred heard that on January 28, 1943 a special infantry unit was forming that being the 442nd. In April 1943, the islanders and mainlanders arrived for training at Camp Shelby, Mississippi. May 1944, they were shipped to Italy, with the onset of winter they were shipped to France.

The rest of this story is in the annals of time and in the minds and hearts of the members of the 442.

Fred A. Shiosaki and George T. Yamada are American heroes, but they are more than that to us at the IEFCC. They are our friends and I am proud to say they are my friends.

Rufus Woods #13 or
"Damdifyno"

George Potter

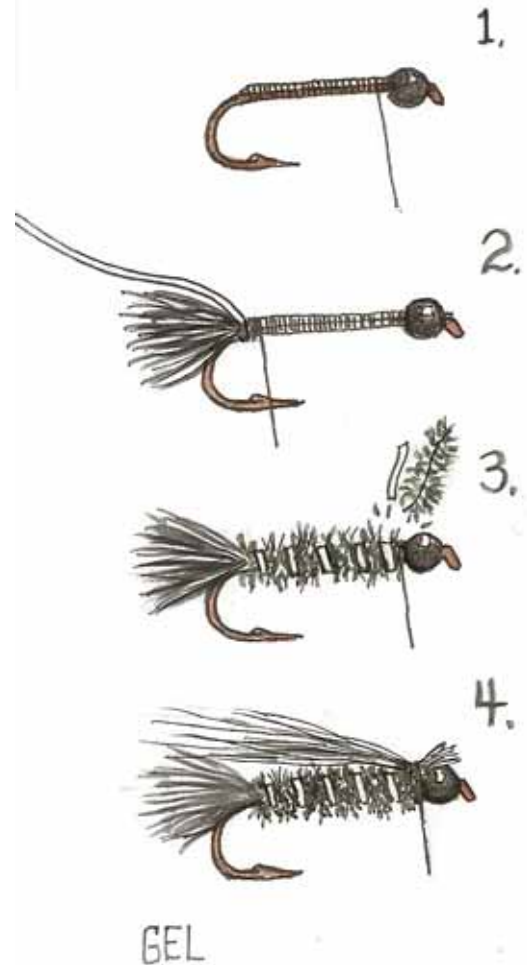
The bleak midwinter can still bring some outstanding fishing for those who persist. The Rufus Woods boys have been having some fantastic days for large rainbows there. At the Liar's Club. George Potter was showing his latest heavy, black pattern for the big Bows. When asked what he called it, he responded, "Damned if I know." What a great name for a fly! Fish it with a Deep 7 sinking line right off the bottom, working in the current or with a very slow retrieve. George has taken fish up to 8 pounds with it and there are larger ones lurking there.

Hook: 6 — 9671 Mustad
Thread: Stout black
Bead: 3/16 metal, black or silver
Lead wire: .035
Tail: Black Marabou fibers
Body: Black cactus chenille with green sparkles
Rib: Size 14 silver mylar
Wing: Black bear hair or equivalent



Use super glue after *each* step)

1. Pinch the barb and slide the bead up to the eye. Line the hook shank with thread. Place a strand of lead wire on top of the hook shank and secure firmly.
2. Tie in a fat bunch of short marabou fibers for the tail. Attach the ribbing.
3. Tie in and wrap the body chenille. Wind the rib and trim.
4. Attach the wing as shown. Whip finish and glue.
